Our goal for this activity, is to find different ways of starting a sentence, so that our sentences don't always start in the same way. This adds complexity and interest to our writing.

Look at the example below. Follow the pattern, and create **new sentences** in order to communicate the **idea** in a different way:

Example:

I love pizza

- (Adverb) **Slowly** eating gooey, cheesy pizza, is the most delicious experience.
- (Adjective) **Salty**, cheesy, mushroom pizza is what I like best.
- (Verb) **Eating** pizza is my favourite activity.
- (Noun) **Pizza** is delicious, and that's why I like it
- (Prepositional phrase) **In** the middle of the night, I like to eat cold, refrigerated pizza
- (Question) **Do I love pizza more than anything in the world?** Yes, I do.
- (Quotation) **"Pizza is my favourite food"**, I tell my mom, as we sit on the couch to meal plan.
- (Infinitive) **To eat** pizza on a Friday night, is to truly live the fine life.
- (Dependent clause) **Although** I love pizza, it's not my favourite food
- (Interjection) **Well**, there's nothing more to say on the topic – mushroom pizza is the best, and that's that.
